Acts 2 Study and Discussion Questions Lesson Five: Hebrews, Part 2 – Hebrews 8-13

Read Hebrews 8.

- 1) Imagine being a Jewish Christian in the first century and living under intense persecution from the Roman authorities, as well as from Jewish family members, who consider your Christian stance a betrayal. The traditions with which you were raised (and with which your parents and grandparents were raised) revolved entirely around the practices of Judaism, a way of life that was acceptable to the state. If you chose to renounce your Christian faith and return to Judaism, you would go back to a life of ritual, not the least of which would be the system of sacrifices. The Temple in Jerusalem was all-important to the Jewish way of life. What does Hebrews 8:1-6 have to say about the Temple (Tabernacle) and about Jesus' ministry that would influence your thinking about returning to your old life?
- 2) Define the word covenant.
- 3) Jesus instituted a new covenant with us.
 - a) What was the basis of the former ("old") covenant? See Deuteronomy 28:1-6, 15-19 and Romans 10:5.
 - **b)** According to Hebrews 8:7-13, how is the new covenant different from the old (see also Romans 7:15-25)?
 - c) What specific pattern of thinking or passion of your heart (8:10) will you ask God to transform?

Read Hebrews 9-10.

4) List the phrases in Hebrews 9:1-10:18 that explain the ways in which the sacrifice system of the old covenant was inferior to Jesus' sacrifice.

- 5) According to Hebrews 10:10, 14, 16, Philippians 1:6, 2:13, and Hebrews 13:20-21, how are those who enter God's new covenant made holy (acceptable to God)?
- 6) Summarize the encouragement and warning in Hebrews 10:19-39 and record things that sometimes deter you from "drawing near to God."

Read Hebrews 11.

- 7) What do these verses teach us about faith?

 - f) Verses 29-30

- 8) Based on the verse immediately preceding chapter 11 (10:39) and the verse immediately following chapter 11 (12:1), what was the writer's purpose in mentioning all of the faithful people listed in chapter 11?
- 9) Why do you think that God providentially reminded you of these things today?

Read Hebrews 12.

10) For the encouragement of your discussion group, share a testimony about how God has used a particular hardship to discipline you.

11) Read Hebrews 12:18-21 in the context of Exodus 19:10-21 and Hebrews 12:22-24 in the context of Psalm 2:6, Revelation 19:1-9, and 21:1-7. Which descriptive words in Hebrews 12:18-24 highlight the difference between living under the old covenant and living in the new covenant?

12) What future scenario is described in Hebrews 12:25-29? Once you have thought about this, spend a few minutes in prayer, obeying the exhortation in verse 28 and using its words, and record how this verse impacted you.

Read Hebrews 13.

13) Which ideas in chapter 13 reflect specific teachings given in chapters 1-12 (include verse numbers)?

- 14) Summarize the subject matter of each of these verse groupings and make notes about anything the Holy Spirit prompts you to act upon.
